The Jordan Riddle Military Social Work Scholarship Campaign

SGT Jordan Riddle of Arlington, Texas was a United States Army combat medic who entered active duty military service on July 4, 2005. SGT Riddle was serving in support of combat operations in Al Diyala Province, Iraq, when he and his recon platoon entered a building rigged with explosives on January 9, 2008. Seven members of his team were killed in the ensuing explosion, and five others, including Jordan, were gravely wounded.

Jordan Riddle spent the next 3 years convalescing from his injuries, and was retired from active duty military service in March of 2011. While his body may have healed, the invisible scars of war proved too much for him to bear, and on October 18, 2012, SGT Jordan Riddle ended his life.

After almost a decade of war, where many service members have served multiple combat tours, stories like Jordan's are becoming far too common. For many veterans, the real battle begins when they return home and attempt to matriculate back into the lives that they once knew, while struggling with the after-effects of war. Therefore the need for social workers to practice in and around the military subculture, both with veterans and their families, is perhaps greater now than at any other time in our nation's history. It is for this reason that the Jordan Riddle Military Social Work Scholarship is being created- to assist current students who are veterans achieve their academic goals while preparing them for careers in military social work.



The Jordan Riddle Military Social Work scholarship will be award for the first time during the 2014 graduation celebration. This scholarship is named in honor of Susan, "Susie", Bernstein who passed away in 2013 at the age of 56 after bravely battling cancer. Susie returned to school as an adult learner once her children were older. She completed her senior year internship in the Title IV-E child welfare program, where her enthusiasm for her work and her dedication to social justice issues were abundantly evident to all who encountered her.

She was a 2003 magna cum laude graduate of our social work program. In 2004, she earned a MSW from the School of Social Work, University of Maryland, Baltimore . Until October of 2012, Susie was a practicing psychotherapist in Annapolis MD.

UMBC faculty members remember her with fondness and clearly recall her diligence, resourcefulness, and commitment to the profession she so loved and admired.

Susie Bernstein is survived by her husband, Dr. Richard Bernstein, and two children, Jeff and Julie. Due to the generosity of the Bernstein family and friends, and Susie herself, the Social Work Program is able to offer this award annually to a deserving returning student.

Her willingness to learn new things and her proficiency in the skills she developed allowed her not only excel in the
