# A Word from the Chair

Our fall semester brought opportunities to reconnect with our students via in person instruction and on campus events. Nearly 70% of our social work courses were offered face-to-face. We also offered online, hybrid, and hyflex course options to best serve our students. We held on-campus welcome events for new students in the Baccalaureate Social Work Program at the UMBC and USG campuses. The students were glad for the opportunity to meet us and each other, albeit masked and socially distanced or outside. UMBC held COVID safe in person convocation and graduation events. 25 social work students graduated in December and were delighted to walk across the stage with their loved ones in attendance.

The spring semester launched in the context of the Omicron COVID wave. We continue to hold most of our classes in person with several online and hyflex options as well. We are providing high quality social work education to our students in the safest possible manner. UMBC is requiring all faculty, staff, and students to be fully vaccinated (including booster; unless exempted) and to wear a KN95 or equivalent mask. We hope to increasingly have opportunities to engage with one another on campus as the semester progresses.

Our Community Advisory Board met this fall and welcomed two new members who are both alumnae of our program: Debra Lindsenmeyer and Atefah Fahtenmed. # Summer 2022 Classes

The Social Work Program is offering a variety of electives this summer, including SOWK 311, which gives students an early opportunity to experience field placement!

## **SOWK 311**- Introduction to Field Experience in Social Work, Thursday 10-12pm (Seminar ONLINE).

In this course students are placed at various human services agencies throughout the Baltimore and Washington D.C. metro area. Students will gain valuable work experience and build their resume and network. Obtain 3 upper level credits. Can be used as a SOWK elective!

# *SOWK 374 (C)-* Social Work with Immigrants and Refugees, Monday, Tuesday and Thursday, 10-12 ONLINE.

This course provides an introduction to the information and skills necessary for generalist social work practice with immigrants and refugees.

\*\*Fulfills 1 culture GEP requirement.

# *SOWK 386-* Social Work Practice with Families, Tuesdays 9-12pm ONLINE.

This course will provide students with the basic knowledge and skills to make initial assessments of family functioning in the context of the social environment and an understanding of the variety of challenges families experience.

## 2022 Phi Alpha Applications Open

Phi Alpha was established in 1962. The purposes of the Honor Society, as stated in its brochure, are to "provide a closer bond among students of social work and promote humanitarian goals and ideals." Further, Phi Alpha "fosters high standards of education for social workers and invites into membership those who have attained excellence in scholarship and achievement in social work." At present, there are 62 chapters of the Honor Society in schools around the country, including the established chapter here at U.M.B.C.

Students are eligible to join if they meet the following membership criteria:

- have declared social work as major
- have achieved sophomore status
- have completed nine semester hours of required social work courses
- have achieved an *overall* grade point average of 3.0 out of possible 4.0; and
- have achieved a 3.50 grade point average in required or elective social work courses.
